LOVE CONQUERS ALL

I have often wondered how heartless humans could abandon their pets to the wild. This is the ilk that falls "in love" with the adorable kitten, but does not want the gorgeous cat. Sadly, these cats are generally not vetted and the cycle of tremendous suffering begins.

Imagine being a kitten, petted and admired by all, and given food and a warm home. Then suddenly one day, when you are no longer entertaining, being taken for a scary car ride and dumped in an unfamiliar place, in the wild.

My yard abuts a wooded park, which sadly has become an animal dumping ground due to its seclusion. Dogs will be picked up for roaming and provided with food/shelter, while their owners or new homes are found.

Cats, on the other hand, are left wholly to fend for themselves — lonely, frightened, confused, trying to find something to eat, a warm place to nest, all the while attempting to avoid woodland predators. My heart just shatters contemplating their plight.

I began leaving food out about eight years ago, when I first became aware of some scrawny cats along the wood line. I fed them in the morning and evening. Over time, they began watching and waiting for me and I could identify them individually. I swore to myself that I wasn't going to name them, or get attached, but Mama, Missy, Whitey, Puma, Canute, Newton and Kenny knew better.

I first contacted the Greater New Haven Cat Project when one of the cats was heavy with pregnancy. That cat, the first I named, became Mama kitty.

The good folks from GNHCP were able to trap all of the cats except Mama, who had gone into hiding to give birth. They spayed and neutered all the trapped cats and gave them their vaccinations. The cats were returned to their location, fixed and healthy.

GNHCP came again when Mama finally emerged on a regular basis. Her kittens were then about six weeks old.

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GNHCP was able to trap Mama and all of her kittens. The kittens were young enough to be malleable, and eventually placed into loving, responsible forever homes of their own. Thanks to GNHCP, they need not live hard-knocks lives, but can live lives of love.

I can't even begin to thank this organization for what they accomplished. If not for their good deeds, this woodland would be crawling with litter after litter of cats born to a life of suffering, despair and disease.

This year the Greater New Haven Cat Project helped again. I noticed that Mama kitty was limping. I watched for over a month hoping for improvement but sadly, there was none. Mama was holding up her right front paw, hobbling and her face was etched with pain. I knew she was suffering. I didn't know what to do; although Mama would come within a couple feet of me, I could never get any closer to her.

I called the GNHCP and they sent out a wonderful woman named Debbie. Debbie used a box trap to capture Mama and brought her straight to the vet. Mama had a deep abscess that wouldn't heal on its own. The vet cleaned it out and gave her antibiotic injections to fight the infection, then Debbie brought Mama back to me. We set her up in a quiet bathroom so she could recuperate. Mama has healed absolutely beautifully.

I am keeping her as an inside kitty so she won't ever have to deal with the elements and predators again. She was very frightened at first but over time, she has slowly come to trust me. As the saying goes, "Love conquers all."

I am so deeply grateful for all GNHCP does to alleviate the suffering of these beautiful creatures. The good works they perform have a definite ripple effect that prevents untold amounts of suffering. They make such a positive difference in the lives of these furry little souls.

Most important is their great love for the abused and forgotten. For it is generously offered in huge measure. It is a key ingredient in making these beautiful, valuable and life changing differences. May God bless all their beautiful, loving hearts!
