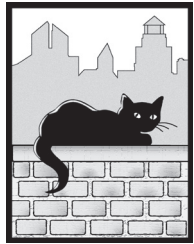

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INHERITING A FAMILY

One morning I awoke to realize that my husband Brian and I had inherited total responsibility for a large intergenerational family of feline residents. Shortly after we bought our 1895 house in New Haven, our new neighbor, Gayle, confided she was deeply worried about the feral cats in her backyard, as she, her husband and son would soon relocate to the Midwest. Gayle had originally rescued 14 feral cats; with the help of The Greater New Haven Cat Project, she began the trap/neuter/return process that saved and vastly enriched those vulnerable lives. Gayle's husband Kirk built shelters, and the feline family began getting meals on a regular basis! Gayle found homes for the few domesticated fur persons, but the true ferals were unapproachable and therefore most vulnerable, dependent on her kindness for warm, dry shelter, food and protection. GNHCP President Cheryl and volunteer Betsy became supportive advisors and official cat aunties.

Gayle and I managed to capture the last non-neutered cat, Loki, and through GNHCP, Loki was spayed and her three tiny kittens adopted, two brothers together and the black-and white sister became my own dear Flora. It was love at first sight with Flora who had black ears tipped with white, like little stars in a midnight sky.

When Gayle's house was sold, we moved Marmalade, Merlin, Agamemnon (Aggie), Grendel, sisters: Loki, Ajax and Dynah, and brother Seigfried (Siggie), to our yard with their shelters, dishes, and uncertainties. They adapted with equanimity, napping in the sun and lining up for dinner with bright faces. Throughout the years, friend Betsy continued to supply extra treats to the changing family and assorted furry visitors.

Six years ago, Cheryl and GNHCP helped again by spaying a sweet all-white mama who appeared in our yard with six newborns. Mom was adopted by a GNHCP volunteer, two kittens were adopted together though our vet, and the four remaining kittens are now part of our own indoor fur family.

Our current solo backyard resident is Major Tom, perhaps a descendant of one of Gayle's original feral cats "Big Orange". A couple of years ago, after our huge backyard maple tree blew down in a storm and destroyed the original shelters, we moved Tom's 'condo' close to our house. He comes into the basement in bad weather and at night for protection. We offer Airbnb apartments, and the Major has become the treasured official greeter for visitors from all over the world! An enthusiastic purr seems to be the universal language.

All the original family members are gone now, many buried in our yard. My precious Flora passed away in my arms in May at a remarkable 20 years old, the last of the original family and a joy for us all her life. Gayle assures me that the "Cat Goddess" led us to buy this house and I must agree that the Cat Goddess blessed us all, feline and human alike!

At first he hid under a shelf but soon let me put my hand in to pet him and he quickly learned that pets were a great thing! Within a month, he was venturing out of his room, exploring and taking his place in our home. At first Tiberious hissed at him a lot, but when Ti slept, Shadowcat would creep over, snuggle up and go to sleep too. Now, Ti will lick him on his head and Matisse and he love to chase each other around the apartment. Shadowcat is a smart, sweet, cockeyed, toothless drooler who loves to cuddle and, even though the vet thinks he's about 8, is a silly kitten at heart; always playing. He's won all our hearts over.

Alicia Butler was someone who always greeted you with a welcoming smile. In her professional list, she was a teacher and school psychologist for the

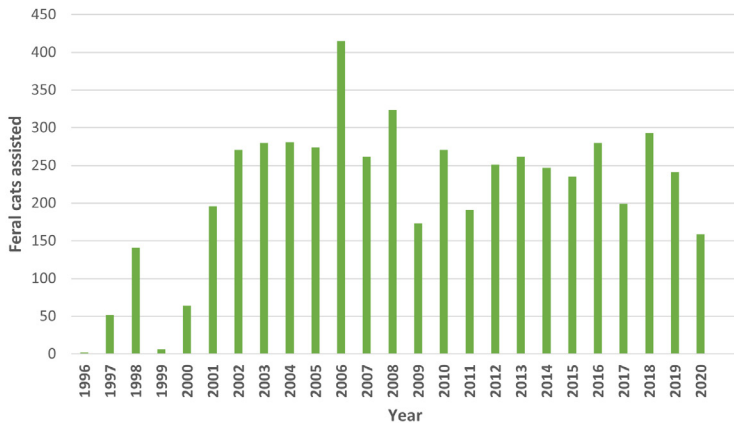
Cromwell public school system dedicated to helping children with special needs. Alicia's special love for cats led her to GNHCP and she began volunteering with our organization in 2005 as one of our Direct Care volunteers, responsible for the Sunday morning cleaning shift at the GNHCP Center. She would often bring her mom, Nancy, to help clean and play with the cats. During this time, Alicia became very close to two GNHCP foster cats, Ben & Brandon, who were rescued with their sister, Beatrice, in Hamden during 2008. Ben & Brandon were very bonded, with Brandon being the shyer of the two. Alice adopted them as young adults in 2011. The "boys" became very fond of Alicia's partner, John, who didn't start out being a "cat guy." (We all know that men who become cat converts make the best parents!). In

2013, Alicia added Zoey (aka Gloria) to the household. Zoey was rescued as part of a trap/neuter/return call in New Haven but did not act like a feral kitten and stole Alicia's heart. Zoey fit right into the feline mix at Alicia and John's, keeping the settled in sibling brothers on their toes.

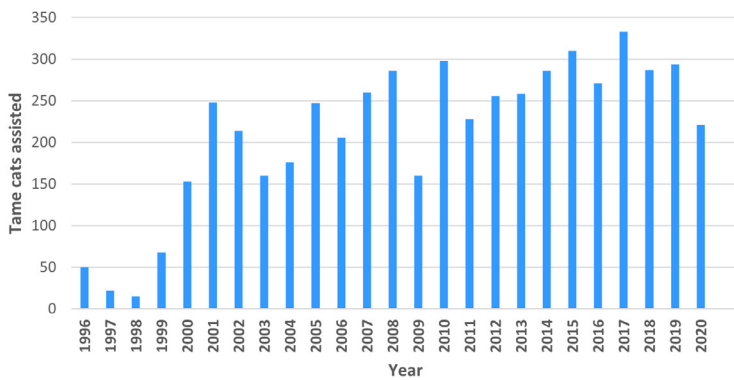
Alicia left the direct care shift shortly after Ben & Brandon's adoptions, but remained active in GNHCP's fundraising efforts, hosting the annual tag sale at her home in Hamden, baking for Coffee & Cats, purchasing items for raffle baskets for the Feral Feline Festival, and attending many of the fundraisers. Alicia was always gracious and willing to help out in any way she could. She will be greatly missed by GNHCP.

At GNHCP, we keep our overhead costs low and the benefits for felines high. We have a strong tradition of stretching our donors' dollars as far as they can go. Our work would not be possible without the generous financial support of caring people like you. Since 1996, GNHCP has been able to provide spay/neuter and veterinary assistance to more than 10,828 feral and stray cats in the greater New Haven area (*see graphs*).

With the flurry of activity that takes place from mid-November through the end of the calendar year, now is the time to consider an end-of-year donation to GNHCP. GNHCP is also able to receive securities.

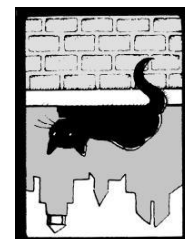
