If you were to ask their neighbors to describe Minerva and Adan, they would tell you about a couple who has a great impact on their community in Fair Haven. Adan is outside every day of the year, helping to clean up the neighborhood and local park, while Minerva cares for the neighborhood cats and is often found speaking with her neighbors about the importance of responsible pet ownership.

Four years ago, Minerva encountered a stray cat at her doorstep. Wanting to care for the cat, she went out and purchased some cat food and started to feed him. Adan cautioned her that soon she would have a whole slew of cats, but she waved him away, loving how friendly the visitor was. As the months went by, Minerva and Adan started to receive more feline visitors until, one day, Minerva realized they now had five daily visitors. "They were all so cute, and some of them were so friendly!"

About two years ago, Minerva noticed one of the strays lying on her porch badly hurt. She started asking around and calling different animal rescues to see if she could get some help for "Kitty" (as her daughter, another animal lover, had named him). She was finally directed to The Greater New Haven Cat Project (GNHCP), and felt a wave of relief

when she heard back from Cheryl, president of GNHCP. "I called and emailed and was so relieved when they actually responded! Cheryl came and picked up the kitten. I was nervous he would not survive since he was in such bad shape. But the vets were able to stitch him up, neuter him and return him to me."

After Kitty was taken care of, GNHCP helped to trap/neuter/return (TNR) the four other cats. They were fixtures around the neighborhood, so the neighbors were happy to be able to get them the help they needed. Adan even built a shelter for them.

"We brought some of them inside during the winter, but they were not all friendly, so this was our solution." Not only are Minerva and Adan taking care of the neighborhood cats, in addition to two of their own, but they are educating their friends and family on caring for their feline friends. Minerva convinced her brother-in-law and mother-in-law to reach out to GNHCP to spay/neuter their own cats and TNR the cats in their neighborhood. She also connected another friend with GNHCP to get them help with their four kittens.

"I am responsible for helping to teach my Latinx community. I try to emphasize that if we all do a little bit, we can make a great change." Minerva is proud to be considered

the "cat lady" in her neighborhood. She is grateful her cats are all vaccinated and spayed/neutered to help keep them healthy. She finds joy every day in feeding them in the morning and the afternoon and she would not have it any other way. "I am so thankful for everything GNHCP has done for me and my friends and family. I always talk about what a great organization it is and how much you all care!"

MELISSA JENSEN

At Melissa Jensen's childhood abode in Willington, near the University of Connecticut, animals were always part of the family. Besides loving the cats and dogs and rabbits who lived in and around the home she shared with her parents and younger sister, Melissa grew up riding horses, participating in the local 4-H club, and spending time with the goats on her aunt's goat farm in Union, Connecticut. "I feel a deep connection with all animals," she says, "and so have been vegetarian since I was 15, and a vegan for the past four years." During her childhood, Melissa's special feline buddy was Jamie, a shorthair calico kitty. "She was sweet and smart, and loved me the most," Melissa remembers. Currently, Melissa's feline companion is Lucy, a fluffy longhair with tabby markings. ("We think she may have some Norwegian forest cat in her, "Melissa says.). Lucy was originally adopted by Melissa's grandmother and came to live with Melissa when her grandmother passed away a few years ago. Lucy, now 16 is "queen of the castle," reigning over the New Haven home that Melissa also shares with her boyfriend Logan.

"Logan was not a cat person until he met me," Melissa says. "But he is now and is happy to play video games and watch baseball with Lucy on his lap."

Melissa, who works as a secretary in the Mathematics Department at Southern Connecticut State University, began looking for volunteer opportunities after moving to New Haven. "I was living down the street from the Cat Project," she says, "and walked past when they were having an open house in April of 2019. I met Cheryl, and I met the cats, and it seemed like a perfect fit." Shortly thereafter, Melissa began doing the Wednesday evening care shift at the GNHCP center.

With Lucy ruling the roost, Melissa won't be bringing home any other permanent feline residents for the time being, although she did foster two kittens early in the covid-19 pandemic. But, when Lucy's time comes, Melissa and Logan will be looking to give a loving home to a bonded pair of senior kitties.

For people who are thinking about volunteering with GNHCP but are reluctant for fear that they will want to adopt all the cats in the center, Melissa says: "I know a lot of people think they can't volunteer because they will want to rescue every animal. But by caring for them in the time you are with them, you are helping to ensure that they will go to good homes – and that is the best feeling."
