FOR RISË NELSON, FIV WAS NO BARRIER TO ADOPTION By Rhea Hirshman

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV) is transmitted through bite wounds from an infected cat. The immune system of an FIV+ cat is compromised, and chronic or recurrent infections (skin, eyes, upper respiratory tract) can result. FIV cats are often referred to as "special needs" cats and overlooked for adoption. What people don't realize is that with a proper living environment, and good nutrition, FIV+ cats can live well into their teens. It is also possible (and has become acceptable) for FIV+ cats to live with cats who do not carry the virus, provided the cats get along and do not fight. FIV is not transmitted through sharing a water or food dish, a litter box or grooming.

For most of her life, Risë Nelson has been a cat magnet. "Wherever I am in the world," she says, "cats always find me." From when she was four years old and persuaded her parents to let her bring in a little stray, Risë has had cats in her life. Throughout Risë's adolescence, she brought home strays and adopted several cats over the years. They included gray and white Nesta ("My special baby," Risë says) who came from GNHCP, and later Osiris whom Risë describes as "twenty pounds of pure muscle – a mini-panther" and who totally bonded with her infant son.

A New Haven native who was recently appointed as the inaugural director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion for the Yale University Library, Risë cared for a colony of community cats when she and her son lived in Fair Haven. By 2020, after Osiris and two other cats passed, there were, for the first time since she was a young child, no cats in Risë's home. "Something was definitely missing from my life," she says.

But now, there is Randy Ray, who was brought into GNHCP for fostering one Saturday in February while Risë was working her monthly shift. After having been abandoned by his owners, Ray took up residence within a feral cat colony in the Fair Haven section of New Haven. He was frightened, nervous, and recovering from an ear injury. He was also a black cat (one of the more difficult to adopt) and FIV+. "I kept thinking about him," Risë says, and offered to foster Ray. After a couple of months, she and her son decided to give Ray, now Randy Ray, a forever home.

Never having had a FIV+ cat, Risë had a lot of questions. But she says, "Caring for him has not been different from caring for any of my other cats." He did have some digestive issues but those are well controlled with frequent small feedings and a grain-free diet.

A kitten mewing in a video caught Randy Ray's attention recently, and Risë is thinking that she and Randy Ray might want to add another furry friend to the household. "He is so playful and loving," Risë says.

"He shows me every day how grateful he is. I would encourage others to adopt a special needs cat – to open their hearts and bring these sweet friends into their homes."


