PATIENCE AND LOVE

Lessons learned by a feral cat lover

Heather has always loved animals. Since the first time she took a stray cat in from her parents' yard, she was destined to care for cats. Over 20 years ago, she experienced her first "foster fail" while volunteering. The moment she heard someone wanted to meet her foster cat, she knew the adoption wasn't going to work out - he was hers. Since then she has adopted and helped a number of cats, including Jeremiah- her first feral cat who would not let anyone touch him at first, Sydneythe black and white cat who sauntered up to her and walked into her carrier at an adoption event,

and Raven, the tiny long-haired, black cat who would sleep on Heather's leaf bags and who would eat around Heather's schedule before eventually moving in.

She currently has 5 cats at home: Ellis, a 21 pound Maine Coon she adopted from The Greater New Haven Cat Project (GNHCP) and her newest additions: three kittens and an orange tabby who she rescued last summer. Heather first discovered the kittens in the shed in her backyard in June of 2020. While feeding the birds in her yard, one of the kittens popped it's head out, alerting her of their presence. She began to feed them, eventually recruiting GNHCP to help TNR (Trap/Neuter/Return). By that time there were the three kittens Titus, Ginger, and Lucille Ball aka "Lucy" and a male cat "Papa Samuel" who started making an appearance later in the summer. Though unsure if Samuel was even the kittens' father, he cared for them so much, Heather considers him their "adoptive" dad. After the cats were spayed/neutered, she welcomed them into her home. The first night, she slept in the living room to "stay close in

case something happened".

Now the four cats live in a large room downstairs with windows to the other rooms. She lets them mingle with Ellis, but that has been a been a slow process. Ellis loves the kittens, and vice versa, but he's not the biggest fan of Papa. So for now she is just keeping them separated.

Papa loves to be petted. Even though he is still scared and slowly learning to trust her,

he purrs when he sees her, loves his cat bed and is happy. The kittens are acclimating more slowly. Titus is a brave little kitten and is happy to explore and say "hi" to Heather, but the girls have been a slower process. Lucy has just started letting Heather really pet her and Ginger is still very, very timid. But Heather finds joy in the every little step. They all walk around with their tails up, they're not hiding their tails between their legs, and Ellis and the kittens hit toys to each other under the door where there's a little space.

"Working with feral cats is not easy. It is important to give them the time that they need. When you adopt an animal you can't expect them to be lap cats immediately, especially when you're trying to socialize them. You need to be slow. You need to be gentle. And to give them time to process that 'Okay, this person is not so bad.' So every little step, every little progress that we make, makes me so happy." It's been wonderful for Heather to see how these cats are blossoming. Though it's taking months, to her they're worth it.

Spott was living in my yard when I bought my house. I learned from the neighbors that they had been caring for him since 2005. I wanted to give Spott better care and readily took to him. He lets me pet him and handle him in case he needs to go to the vet. We made two trips to the vet last year because he injured his foot and needed antibiotics. He trusts me and now spends the cold winters in my three seasons room. I built a cardboard box shelter that has blankets all around it, and have a warming bed inside that stays plugged in. I crack open one of the sliding doors so that Spott can come and go as he pleases. He prefers to remain an outdoor kitty, but is the most spoiled feral you will ever meet! I would readily take him in as a housecat, but he says "no" to that.
