SAVING MOLLY BY JEANNINE

I would like to take this opportunity to thank The Greater New Haven Cat Project. Without them "Molly" would not be with us today.

Molly first came to us approximately 1.5 years ago. She showed up in our yard as a kitten licking up the bird seeds under the birdfeeder. She would not let us get near her, but we thought she might be a baby bobcat since she had no tail. As time went on, we noted she was not growing as a baby bobcat would and it became apparent that she was a domestic cat, specifically a Manx.

My daughter continued to put food out by the birdfeeder for her to eat over the next few months and one day, she showed up

on our deck for food. It was at this point that we realized the horrific trauma she had endured. It appeared like her tail was somehow scalped from her body. There was a very large wound where the base of the tail should have been. The edges were not clean and it didn't seem like there was any skin that could be pulled together to suture it. Some days the wound look like it was drying out and then other times, sometimes for weeks, it would be red, raw and bloody. Unfortunately, she would not let us near her. I started making numerous phone calls to different vets and organizations in the Naugatuck area, and no one was able to help.

Winter was coming so we purchased a cat house and put it out on the deck- she barely slept in it. I continued my search and thankfully found the Greater New Haven Cat Project (GNHCP). After a few conversations with Cheryl, we devised a plan to capture the cat and get her evaluated. My children and I were able to capture Molly in a crate and I brought her to New Haven to Cheryl at the Cat Project. When they saw the cat and the extent of the injury, they were nervous that Molly may have to be euthanized. The idea made my stomach sink.

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Luckily, the veterinarian that evaluated Molly devised a surgical plan to save her. Fortunately, there was enough skin to suture the wounds around the base of the tail and over the tail stump. There were a lot of bumps in the road with one of surgical sites, but everybody kept caring and rooting for Molly and she pulled through! Between GNHCP and the veterinarian hospital, they treated Molly for over a month. Besides her surgical repair she also was spayed, received all her vaccines and was FeLV/FIV tested. The Greater New Haven Cat Project literally saved Molly's life! There is no way she would be able to continue and survive in the condition she was in.

Molly is an indoor cat now, too! I will be forever grateful for the care they gave to Molly and the assistance to my family.

Growing up in West Haven, Bryan Weber always had dogs. Kate Weber, on the other hand, who also grew up in West Haven, always had cats in her family. Now, it's cats all the way for the couple – except for one rabbit, who belonged to Kate's granddaughter but is now a permanent resident sharing the Webers' home with six feline companions.

Kate and Bryan both worked for over thirty years at Eder Brothers, a wholesale wine and spirits distributor — Bryan as a driver and warehouse supervisor and Kate in both the purchasing department and the credit department. They connected at the company when Kate and other colleagues helped Bryan sort through the belongings of his first wife, who passed away in 2002. When Bryan and Kate married in 2009, Kate's cats were part of the deal.

After retiring in 2016, Kate explored volunteering with some local animal rescue facilities, and ultimately connected with GNHCP in January of 2017. Bryan retired from Eder Brothers about a year later – although he continues to work as a parttime trailer driver for a local company – and subsequently joined Kate at the Cat Project. Together, they do the Wednesday morning direct care shift and Kate participates in other activities such as building the outdoor shelters that are distributed to community cat caregivers.

Of their six current feline residents, three are from the Cat Project — Babette, Jackson, and Riley (*pictured on the right*). Kate fell in love with Riley (formerly Birdie) soon after she began volunteering with GNHCP. When the City of New Haven shut down in March of 2020 due to COVID-19, the Center had to close, and all the cats had to be evacuated to foster homes. Kate and Bryan volunteered to foster Jackson and became happy foster failures. And, in December of 2019, Bryan brought home Babette as a Christmas present for Kate.

Thanks to Kate and Bryan for opening their home to so many kitties, and for caring for those being fostered at GNHCP while awaiting their own forever homes.
