TWO (OR MORE) ARE BETTER THAN ONE: ADOPTING CATS TOGETHER

When Amy Davis and her partner Brian Humpal came to adopt a cat from GNHCP a couple of years ago, they had planned to adopt just one. Fast forward to today, and they now have four cats, all from GNHCP. Most recently, the couple adopted Maren and Marnie (now Molly and Ginny, respectively) a young adult mother-daughter pair.

For a while, Amy had wanted to adopt a bonded pair – cats that have a prior special connection that most often occurs with littermates who grow up together but can also form between unrelated cats. Her sister had also encouraged Amy and Brian to adopt a bonded pair. Adopting two cats together often helps them to adjust more easily in their new surroundings. This companionship can be especially important for bonded pairs, who often struggle to adjust or become depressed if separated.

Amy and Brian had already seen the benefits of adopting two cats together with their cats Minnie and Wolfie (previously named Meadow and Turbo). They adopted Minnie and Wolfie just two weeks apart in July of 2022. One of the shyest fosters, Minnie had kept her distance and hid when Amy and Brian visited the GNHCP's center one day. Then, as Amy and Brian were preparing to leave, it was as if Minnie knew her moment had come.

She approached the couple and started rubbing against their legs. To Amy, this was a sign. When she told the story to her friends, they agreed: the cat had chosen her new family, and Amy had to adopt her.

But during that visit, Amy and Brian's son Jackson had also connected with a gray male kitten and they decided to adopt him as well. In hindsight, they believe that adopting Wolfie really helped Minnie with the transition into a new home. A shy cat, Minnie hid under a bed for a long time before she started to explore. Wolfie was familiar to her from her time at the shelter, and since he was a kitten, he was outgoing and fearless. He helped Minnie feel safe to come out of her shell and settle into her new home.



The Greater New Haven Cat Project, Inc. (GNHCP) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization formed in 1996 to address the problems of cat overpopulation, neglect and abuse in our area. GNHCP provides spay/neuter assistance for feral, stray and abandoned cats, and promotes responsible pet ownership through educational workshops. The organization is comprised primarily of volunteers, and is funded through private donations, fundraising events and grants.

When the couple brought Molly and Ginny into the home a little over a year later, they saw a similar dynamic. Molly, the more adventurous of the pair, was the first to explore the house. Ginny was timid, and much slower to come out of the office space that they started in. Without Molly's example to encourage her, Ginny would have taken longer to settle in.

Once the two cats did feel at home, though, the bond that Molly and Ginny shared became less apparent. Almost immediately, Molly bonded with Jackson and Ginny connected with Brian. Ginny is a talker, and she will cry for Brian when he leaves. While Molly was fairly protective of Ginny while they were at the center, now she seems mostly indifferent to Ginny's distress. The family jokes about how independent the two are from each other. "Bonded pair, huh?" they ask.




